
## **Sharing Original Videos**

The use of video content in education is growing swiftly and WOU is no exception! You and your students have a lot of options for sharing original video content with one another on Moodle. As you prepare for fall term, we'd like to share some of our recommendations with you.

Posting to YouTube and Other Hosting Sites:

For the most consistent and responsive viewing experience, we typically recommend posting unlisted videos to YouTube or similar sites (i.e. Vimeo) and then embedding them in your course. Moodle supports automatic embedding of both YouTube and Vimeo videos, so you don't even need an embed code! Simply paste or create a link using the text editor anywhere in your Moodle course:




These links will only look like links in the editing window but will display as embedded video files on the page after you save your changes.

It's a good idea to be aware of privacy options and size limits on these sites, though. If you are sharing videos containing private or protected information, you may not want to use a service like YouTube. In this case, we suggest uploading your video files directly to Moodle, as described below.

## Uploading Video Files to Moodle:

You can add video files to your course page in Moodle by turning editing on and simply dragging and dropping a file from your computer into your course:



If you choose to upload video files directly to your course page in Moodle, we recommend using the MP4 file format and choosing the "pop-up" display option for your files. This format and display option produce the best results across web browsers and devices.
