IV. OLD BUSINESS

- a. Building renovations status report
 - i. NS 115 Organic Chem Lab bench top computer stations are slated for completion spring break.
 - ii. Glassware Storage Room Remodeling Project 3 office suite nearly completed. Bryan will move down there and share a space with Emma Dutton; Patrick Aldrich and K.C. Walsh will also move into this space. We are hoping Avery Cotton can move into the space being vacated by Sam Cole in MNB.
 - iii. NS 004 remodel / smartroom status is on schedule for this summer.
- b. NSM Curriculum Committee: Status report on NSM LACC course proposal criteria (Cheryl Beaver); need final criteria by April division meeting to allow for discussion and vote before end of year.
- c. Professional Concerns Committee (Pete Poston): We need any by-law changes in draft form from the committee for the April Division meeting to allow for discussion and vote before the end of the year.

- d. NSM Informatics Program Working Group: Taylor, Kruczek, Dutton, LeMaster, Courtney. We are waiting on the Dean for further direction/action.
- e. 2010 Spring NSM Student Awards Night Date Thursday, May 27. Laurie and Sharyne will oversee plans for this program.

V. NEW BUSINESS

- a. NSM Division New Tenure-Line Requests. It is unknown what the tenure-line hiring process will look like for 2010-11. Scott asked what the process is. Steve said we need to convene the department chairs and submit a division plan by the 3rd week of April for discussion. There are justification forms that we can obtain from the Provost's office, they should come out by mid May.
- b. NSM Division 2010-2011 budget planning there is no new news regarding budgets for next year. The new budget will be available with the beginning of the new fiscal year, 7-1-2010.
- c. Review of student honor code. Arlene reported that she had had some students access information on her webpage that they should not have. Bryan said he is announcing expectations at the beginning of the term in regards to student honesty. Niki added that another division has had issues with students writing their course number in pencil on Course Substitution forms and then changing the number after the signatures are obtained. It is recommended to always write course numbers in ink. Klay described how the student conduct committee works. Erin remarked that there is a growing trend of a lack of ethics in college students.

VI. REPORTS

a. NSM Budget Update – current budget trajectory is on tract, see page 7 of handout. The Dean has an increasing deficit in his budget.

NOTE: Spring purchasing / budget spend-down: 90%+ of all faculty/departmental purchases must be completed by the end of the third week of Spring Term classes; Friday April 16, 2010. Plan ahead!

Dean's note on year-end opportunity funds / AIC process: the Dean noted that there would be some opportunity funds this year. Sarah said AIC met two weeks ago, they modified the Provost's form: removed the Dean's signature, modified vendor information, submitted to all dept. chairs. They have been told that there is \$0-\$200,000 in AIC funding. The committee members have to have a ranked list next week. They want to have the list evaluated by April 1. The funds will not be split equally but rather by the ranked list, the Provost will make the call. Some factors will be the teaching impact, scholarship impact, with a preference for interdisciplinary areas. Our list will go to Steve for signature, then to Sarah, and then Joe Harchanko by 4-15. Long term we would like to see funds for renovations in the math computer lab. One possibility is for the instructor station computer to have access to what is on the students' individual screens. Please provide a ranked list to Steve by March 8.

b. Faculty Senate

The proposal to delete Fire Services was denied. The new changes in the Department of Teacher Education proposal have been put forth. Bryan has copies of the new Education proposal. There have been recent changes made to the proposal. They are taking on their own advising. A proposed change in the Honors section suggested dropping required GS courses from 15 to 12 credits. However, a statement about contact hours in their supporting documents is not correct. Bryan will mention the correction at Faculty Senate.

It is hoped that faculty evaluations will be conducted electronically with the to-be-developed SIR form. The committee is working on the model.

Linda Stonecipher is proposing that 3 year baccalaureate degrees be accepted by WOU from countries that are signatories of the Bologna Declaration.

c. Curriculum Committee (Division and Campus) – see handout on page 8 – Laurie's notes (Laurie was ill and not able to attend today's division meeting so sent notes).

- 1) All divisions were satisfied with DTE collaboration and the EC, EC/Elem and Elem/Middle program changes were unanimously recommended for approval.
- 2) The Honors committee will now "serve as CC" for honors course and program change proposals. This motion was made and unanimously approved by the CC.

Note: The honors course proposals will go through the usual process-Enter in the Portal which will then route through faculty > department > division chair > division cc > senate committee (honors) > senate > dean > provost.

- 3) As a division, please make sure to forward proposals that are well explained to help avoid confusion at the senate committee level and faculty senate levels.
- d. AIC see earlier comments
- e. Faculty Development every applicant received a faculty development award in the last round. April 2, 2010 is the new due date for release time. The funds available are pretty typical to former years. Regarding faculty mass transport funding, we have approximately half of the division budget allotment left for this fiscal year.
- f. AFT/WOU Faculty Union Scott Beaver reporting. At the AFT Oregon State convention there will be a call for delegates to attend the AFT National conference in Seattle this summer. They have just finished with bargaining. Scott suggested keeping in mind what faculty would want to have included in the next bargaining session.
- g. Academic Requirement Committee –

All proposals passed. Fresh start will go to Faculty Senate eventually. They are not sure of the new name. Students will be able to withdraw from classes up to the 7th week of the term. Klay doesn't know how long a prior catalog will apply to a student's program, possibly seven years. Currently we follow the OUS pattern of a catalog applying to a student's program for five years. Incomplete grade policy is being discussed, to possibly have an "I" remain an "I" on a transcript instead of changing to an "F" after one year if a student does not complete the required work. The consensus among those present at this division meeting felt that an "I" should turn to an "F" after a year if the work is not completed.

There are currently some problems with the "blue" form used for registration and overrides in regard to changing time conflicts and pre-requisite approvals. It was felt the best way to circumvent these problems would be for an on-line approval form to be developed and utilized.

- h. PRC all of the files for this year are on their way on the next step of the process.
- i. LACC Erin

Proposed LACC criteria being developed, tentatively to include the following:

- carry lower-division designation,
- address one or more of the WOU General Education Learning Outcomes.
- be designated as either:
 - o a general survey course, or
 - o a focused introductory-level course that brings the student into the methods, practices, and ways of knowing the field.

The committee is still working on addressing issues related to Writing Intensive courses.

There will be a union meeting at The Crush this Tuesday evening.

V. NEW BUSINESS

- a. Administrative exploration of Informatics degree program at WOU (medical-, bio-, geo-, forensic, business)
 - -Steve attended a meeting with the Dean and other department representatives.
 - -A new "Informatics" program is under consideration by admin.
 - -This is thought to be part of the solution of what to do with pre-nursing student that don't get into nursing school. It would be a hybrid, not one department.
 - -Steve asked for a preliminary discussion, with a possibly a separate meeting later.
 - -Arlene: This sounds like the type of thing that is offered at 2 year institutions
 - -Mike L: Students in pre-nursing want to be nurses, not computer techs.
 - -Laurie: Regarding the list of courses, BA 243 should not be there; it should be MTH 243. In general we should have input on course selection.
 - -Steve: generally supportive of this degree but it is too narrowly focused currently.
 - -Steve will send a response to the dean for those departments that would like.
 - -Mike L. said that biology would like to wait and see it develop further before commenting formally.
 - -Please send comments to Steve in the next two weeks.
- b. Grant opportunity U.S. Dept. of Ed. Trio Grant/McNair Research Scholarships for under-represented groups (Self Identified NSM Faculty: Dutton, Latham, Flatt, Aldrich, Latham, Howard any others? Math?)
 - -Added Mike LeMaster, Klay Kruczek, and Erin Baumgartner to the list.
- c. 2010 Spring NSM Student Awards Honors Night Faculty Facilitator and Organizer needed?
 - -Laurie and Sharyne will organize it again this year.

VI. REPORTS

- a. NSM Budget Update
 - -Item of concern: projected -\$130,000 deficit in LAS instructional budget for spring terms
 - -NOTE: Spring purchasing / budget spend-down: 90+% of all faculty/departmental purchases must be completed by the end of the third week of Spring Term classes; Friday April 16, 2010. Plan ahead!
- b. Academic Requirements Committee (Klay) "Re-start" program; Add/Drop Dates; student-catalog duration
 - -Currently students use a five year catalog; the ARC would like it to be longer possibly 7 years.
 - -It was decided that this doesn't really affect us much; everyone was fine with making it 7 years.
 - -Klay explained Fresh Start or Re-start program
 - -Laurie expressed a concern about transfer students. There are already plans for transfer students to have WOU only GPA
 - -No other concerns, division is generally in support of this.
 - -Add / Drop dates have been modified. The proposal went through Faculty Senate at the last January meeting.
- c. Faculty Senate Fire Services Admin. Program Change
 - -LaRon Tolley presented the proposal to drop minor requirement from the Fire Service Administration major
 - -97% of students in this program are distance students and have to take courses elsewhere or online to meet this requirement
 - -it has passed curriculum committee
 - -In general the division thinks this sets a bad precedence, is overall a weak proposal with insufficient justification, no specific replacement.
 - -Should not be a BA or BS degree if minor is eliminated
 - -Division straw poll vote on this proposal No (6), Yes (0)
- d. Faculty Development Committee
- e. AFT/WOU Faculty Union
- f. Curriculum Committee (Division and Campus
 - -At the last meeting Laurie Burton was told that she cannot vote since she is the chair. It was agreed that this is not correct and Laurie should vote or we should be allowed another representative.
 - -Dept of Ed proposal is a no vote as is, but if continued meetings with Social Science and Humanities are successful, we will vote "yes".
 - -Psychology is a looming issue, but the division is alright with this.
 - -If this proposal ultimately gets approved, it will be due largely due to the efforts of Adel.
- g. PRC status: all files submitted to Dean; Thanks PRC!
- h. LACC / Gen. Ed. Review Committee: Erin Baumgartner
 - -looking at Writing Intensive requirements and rubric for decision making

- i. Academic Infrastructure Committee: Sarah Boomer
 - -Last year there were close to one million in funds allocated; this year the AIC was told it could expect \$200,000 at most.
 - -Joseph Harchanko brought a list of showing amount of S&S budget received by various university departments
 - -Mark Weiss went over this list. He stated that he is not in a position to prioritize items and that the AIC needs to do this.
 - -Clearly, this will be a difficult, contentious task.
 - -AIC is supposed to have list prioritized and give a formal presentation on April 15th.
- j. International Education Committee (Haberman)
 - -Michelle Price presented two study at sea programs which will be voted on in 2 weeks; she will go with the IEC's recommendation.
 - Sea Semester is smaller groups of students on a sailing ship.
 - -Semester at Sea is a large cruise ship
 - Both programs are academically sound but Karen doesn't support Semester at Sea due to the environment impact of cruise ships
 - -Division generally agreed to recommend Sea Semester for WOU approval but not Semester at Sea.
 - -Students can still participate in non-WOU approved programs by making it part of their degree plan with their advisor and sending through signature loop.

It was moved and seconded to adjourn the meeting at 5:15 pm.
