



# housing & dining

You'll find more than a dorm room at Western. Whether you're coming to campus from across town or across the country, you'll become part of a community family away from home. Studies show (as well as exam scores!) that living on campus results in higher GPAs, successful graduation rate and making friendships that can last a lifetime. Our residence halls are all within walking distance of classes, cafes and restaurants, and most importantly, coffee shops.

There are plenty of room and board options, as well as living and learning opportunities that will round out your classroom experiences. The success of oncampus students is the primary reason Western values its live-in requirement for freshmen. Single freshmen without dependents and who enter WOU within one year of high school graduation are required to spend their first year in university-operated housing.

Many returning and transferring students also choose to live on campus; for convenience, friendships, services and many a wide variety free activities and campus events.

WOU offers five different housing options. Ackerman Hall, the most environmentally friendly residence hall in the nation, houses more than 300 students in various themed communities. In Landers Hall, there are small communities of 18 people. Heritage Hall has larger groupings of 32, and Barnum and Gentle Halls have three- to four-person rooms with adjoining bathrooms (except Gentle Hall). No matter where you choose to live, every room comes with phone, internet and cable access. (Free wireless access is available to all WOU students!) You're welcome to decorate and make the room yours. (Be sure to fill out the roommate questionnaire so we can find a good match for you!) After your freshman year, there are options which include a suite with private bathroom or a four-person apartment with full kitchen.



- When to apply: High school students can apply beginning September 1 of their senior year. Students who submit a completed file by Feb. 11, 2011 will receive priority scholarship consideration. Apply online at www. wou.edu/admissions or use the application mailed with the WOU viewbook.
- **Notification:** We will respond to you within three weeks after receiving your application.
- What you need: Application for admission, a list of your senior year courses, application fee, official transcripts from all high schools and colleges attended, ACT or SAT test scores.
- Final transcripts: Send a final high school transcript, which shows your graduation date.

# financial aid

Like 67 percent of WOU students, you too can achieve your educational goals with the assistance of financial aid. If you need help funding your college experience, WOU offers several ways to help. Grants, loans and campus employment are some of the options available, depending on your individual need. To be considered for federal aid, complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.gov each year. Apply by the priority date of March 1 to be considered for the maximum number of aid programs available.

# freshman requirements

admissions

- 1. Graduate from a standard or accredited high school.
- 2. Cumulative 2.75 GPA. Alternative: applicants with a cumulative GPA between 2.50 and 2.74 are eligible for admission with a composite score of 21 on the ACT or combined score of 1,000 on the Critical Reading and Mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Exam.
- 3. Submit ACT or SAT Reasoning Exam scores which include a standardized writing examination. Applicants with a 2.75 cumulative GPA who graduated prior to 2008 are exempt from this requirement.
- 4. Complete 14 units of college preparatory work with a C- or higher: 4 units/years English, 3 units/years math (including Algebra II or higher), 2 units/years science, 3 units/years social studies, 2 units/years of the same foreign language.\*
- 5. Graduates of unaccredited high schools, including students who are home-schooled, must:
  - a. Receive a 21 on the ACT or a minimum combined score of 1,000 on the Critical Reading and Mathematics sections of the SAT Reasoning Exam.
  - Receive an average of 470 on two subject tests (math level I or IIc; and a second test of your choice) for a minimum combined score of 940 on the SAT Subject Test.
  - c. Meet the foreign language requirement.\*
- 6. Students who did not graduate from high school must:
  - a. Receive a minimum score of 410 on each of the five GED tests.
    - b. Receive an average score of 550 for the five tests.
      - c. Meet the foreign language requirement, if graduating class would have been 1997 or later.\*
        - \* If you do not have two years of the same foreign language in high school, you must take two quarters of college-level foreign language at WOU.

# transfer requirements

- 1. Cumulative 2.25 grade point average or higher in college-level work attempted and be in good standing at all prior institutions attended.
- 2. 36 transferable quarter hours or 24 semester hours completed at the time of application.
- 3. 2011 high school graduates with college credit are required to follow freshman application procedures and meet freshman admission requirements regardless of whether they meet the transfer student requirements.

If you have fewer than 36 quarter hours or 24 semester hours completed, you will need to meet freshman requirements. Students who graduated from high school after 1996 must meet the foreign language requirement. Send your high school transcript if you meet this requirement. If not, you will be required to take two quarters of college-level foreign language before transferring or after admission.

# left coast living

When you're here, take some time to visit the local area. Pubs, restaurants, pizza and sub shops, and convenience stores are all within walking distance of campus. And when you feel the need to put down the books, explore the greater Willamette Valley. Here are a few places to consider when you need to get away for a few hours (or for the weekend!):

- 1. Take in the big city. Downtown Portland is just over an hour north on Interstate 5; Mt. Hood is visible in the distance.
- 2. Play in the ocean. (But you'll need a wetsuit if you're really serious about it.) The Oregon coastline has hundreds of miles of beaches and numerous camping spots.
  - 3. Lobby with a legislator. (Or shake hands with one anyway...) The state capitol, Salem, is about 20 miles from campus.
  - **4**. **Take a hike.** Multnomah Falls is located about 30 miles east of Portland. Silver Falls National Park, just 30 minutes east of Salem features ten waterfalls and miles of hiking and biking trails.
  - **5.** Brave the rapids. Go white water rafting on the Clackamas River, just 30 minutes south of Portland. Oregon's spectacular rivers are definitely worth exploring.
  - 6. Play in the powder. Snowboarding is as near as the Cascades (Mt. Hood is less than two hours away.)





Yes, it's true - it rains in Oregon. Average rainfall is about five inches a month in the winter, but less than an inch during the summer. Fortunately, the deep winter snows and cool spring weather help preserve the mountain snowpack in the Pacific Northwest, making possible year-round skiing and snowboarding.

Our professors encourage out-of-classroom learning. The faculty is actively engaged in mentoring undergraduate students and providing them with learning opportunities that extend beyond the traditional classroom. The campus-wide program for Undergraduate Research Experiences focuses on ways to foster, enhance, and increase undergraduate research, scholarship, and creative activity by encouraging active collaboration between students and faculty. The WOU Academic Advising and Learning Center can play a key role in your academic success. Students that communicate with their advisors each quarter experience much greater success in staying on track - and graduating in a timely manner. Music professor Dr. Kevin Walczyk received the Certificate of Merit for Outstanding Faculty Advisor in 2009.

In 2010, Dr. Marita Cardinal was awarded a Certificate of Merit in the faculty academic advising category and Karen Sullivan-Vance, director of the Academic Advising and Learning Center was selected as an Outstanding Advising Award Winner. "At Western, students come first," Karen said. "The faculty are committed to teaching, and to teaching students. 
the high caliber of student work produced in our art department during the year.

The Education Trust ranked Western Oregon University (WOU) first in the nation for the smallest white-Hispanic gap in graduation rates among public colleges and universities. The gap was listed as 5.9 percent in the report released August 9. The report commends WOU's substantial improvement in graduation rates among the Latino population, stating, "this improvement is the result of deliberate, purposeful work by the university. Western Oregon's success in improving graduation rates and eliminating gaps can serve as an inspiration."

# scholarships

Most Western scholarships are distributed over multiple years and are awarded to new freshmen and transfer students based on academic achievement data from the admissions application. Freshman applicants with a 3.4 GPA or above and a combined score of 1,000 on the Critical Reading and Mathematics sections of the SAT, or a composite score of 21 on the ACT, will be most competitive for scholarships. Transfer students should have a transferable GPA of 3.5 or higher. Go online for the complete list of scholarship opportunities.


